## An Invitation to RMCC From SWRCF

As many of you know, I am also the Newsletter editor for a model airplane flying club, called Speedworld Radio Control Flyers. (SWRCF, for short.)

Each year, this club hosts two different major flying events, and several other "fun" events. The 2 flying events are both major pylon racing contests. The contests are either national, as is the first one, or international as is the second one. In these contests there are four airplanes flying around a mile and a quarter proscribed circle at speeds up to 180 miles per hour, give or take a few MPH. Their engines are screaming at about 27,000 RPM and they finish the 1-1/4 mile course in a little over one minute. The record is about 1.02 minutes. Needless to say there are often crashes, either mid-air, or into the solid desert ground. These contests are the first of the season for the pilots who participate. They leave the Phoenix area and continue the year's races all over the country.

Most of the pilots have said

that the races held at our SWRCF field are the best managed of all the races throughout the country. Even the racers who come from foreign countries such as Italy, Australia, Japan, Mexico, China, Canada, The Netherlands, and Taiwan, agree that we hold a very professionally managed race. We have state of the art electronic racing equipment that was designed by some of our own club members which is not available anywhere else.

These races will be held this year at our flying field in Whittman, AZ as follows:

1. January 21 & 22, 2006 starting at 8:00 AM until ~ 4:00 PM. This race is known as The Winterfest Races.
2. February 25 & 26, 2006 starting 8:00 AM until ~ 4:00 PM. This race is known as The JR Gold Cup Races.

Another interesting event planned for this year is:

- An Open House on Janu-

ary 7, 2006 where the community is invited to come and see how model airplanes are flown.

So, where in the world is Whittman, Arizona? We are on the northwest corner of the Phoenix area. Go north on Highway 60 about 5 miles past Bell Road and past Sun City West and Sun City Grand, to Happy Valley Road. Turn left on Happy Valley Road and continue 1 1/2 miles until you see the sign for Speedworld racing complex and Speedworld RC Flyers. There will be a small parking fee collected as you enter.

Lunch can also be purchased at the Flight Line Café right there where all the pilots are preparing their airplanes for the next heat.

I will be there, but you may not see me because I will be down in the cage watching for the airplanes to cut the first pylon on the course.

People who come for the first time say they never thought there was anything like this around here. Come on out and see what it's like! ☺
